The Jack in the Green consists of a wooden or wicker frame that is covered in woven foliage, including green branches, leaves, and flowers. It is worn on the upper half of a human body and carried along in May Day processions. There is often a slot in the frame out of which the individual inside of it can see, and the individual's feet can often be seen below the framework.

The Committee and I send you all best wishes for a Healthy and Happy New Year.



IN MEMORIAM

Rev Canon Allan Kemp

The Rev'd. Allan Kemp, a former member of Newent Probus Club, died on Boxing Day 2021 in Gloucester Hospital, at the age of 78. He had been in failing health for some time.

Allan trained for the Church of England ministry at Bishop's College, Cheshunt and Oakhill College, Southgate, London. He was ordained as Deacon in 1968 and as Priest in 1969. He was curate at St. James's Church, Tunbridge Wells, from 1968-1976, then Vicar of St. Mary's Church, Becontree, from 1976-1990. He was Rural Dean of Barking and Dagenham from 1981-1986 and Vicar of Great and Little Chesterford from 1990-2007. In 1999 he was made a Canon of Chelmsford Cathedral. He retired in 2007, when he and his wife Sandra moved to Newent.

Allan joined Probus holding the position of Almoner for a time. He continued his ministry by helping out at local churches, particularly St. Mary's in Newent. He was well known in Newent for his work in the charity shop. Once in a talk at Probus he mentioned how walking the dog enabled him to connect with people, and he would often walk his dog to the Arboretum to meet people. He was a very likeable person, with a good sense of humour. He had certain misgivings about where the church might be heading, misgivings some of which I share. In his latter days in Probus he began to walk with a stick and his health, and that of his wife Sandra, began to fail. He will be missed by many in Newent, and to his wife and family we extend our deepest sympathies.
